Initially trained in mathematics in Paris (graduation in 2001), I have learned the history of medieval sciences in Europe for my postgraduate studies at the EPHE in Paris under the direction of Danielle Jacquart (PhD in 2007). Since my first research I'm interested in "intermediate sciences", as some historical actors named them, i.e. sciences relying on mathematics to study natural phenomenon: chiefly optics, music and astronomy in the late medieval period in Europe. My main current project is *ALFA, Shaping a European scientific scene: Alfonsine astronomy* ([alfa.hypotheses.org](http://alfa.hypotheses.org)) an ERC project dedicated to the study of the Alfonsine astronomy tradition dominant in Latin sources from the 14<sup>th</sup> century to the early 16<sup>th</sup> century. I'm also interested in the development of new methodologies and new access to manuscript sources in relation to digital humanities and its emerging interface with artificial intelligence approaches.

I have had the pleasure to serve the ESHS as webmaster from June 2015 up to now. In this function as an ESHS officer I have participated to different collective actions of the society. In particular I have contributed to the creation and first steps of the Early career scholar network of the ESHS. If I have the privilege to be elected as a member of the society scientific board I will, in addition to the usual duties of a scientific board member, devote myself primarily to the nurturing of this network who successfully organised its first encounter in Paris last year (about a 100 participants) and have an upcoming one scheduled in Athens next year.
